

# Report links poverty with poor health

Research by the Strategy has shown a link between poverty and health. The health of Australia's poor is poor, with high rates of disease, disability and death. The poor are also more likely to be disabled, to have chronic illness and to die earlier.

Compared with the advantaged, the poor have higher death rates from influenza, bronchitis and asthma, lung cancer, heart disease and diabetes.

Their children are more likely to die from sudden infant death syndrome and hepatitis. Boys from poor areas are 164 per cent more likely to be in foster care.
