Mr Gregory who was formerly the Director of the Victorian and Tasmanian Methodist Department of Child Care and the Child Care Service of the Uniting Church (interim) has been in child care work for the past fifteen years.

He is probably best known in Victoria through his pioneering work in the field on intercountry adoption. He has visited Asia on several occasions to establish agency contacts.

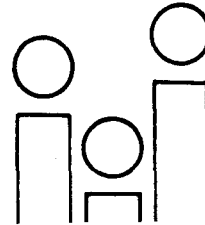
COME TO ALICE

Age cartoonist, Rowley, has his own feelings about the reasons for the poor quality of children's television. We thank him and the Age for the permission to reproduce.



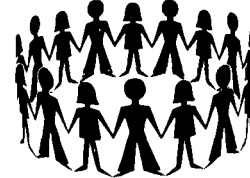
Canon Harmer Retires

The Mission has a large and diverse child welfare program which has in the main been developed during the Canon's years as Director.

From 1961-76 he was a member of the Children's Welfare Association Executive Committee and he has served on innumerable church and welfare bodies.

RESOURCE CENTRE FOR PRE-SCHOOL ASSOC.



The Australian Pre-School Association is to establish a Resource Information Service to help people keep up with developments in the early childhood field.

Four "options" are being offered as part of the service, and subscribers may take any combination of the four or the complete "package".

"Most people don't realize the number and variety of children's services in Australia, unless they are directly involved," says Mr Alan Holmes, the Executive Director of A.P.A. "Federal and State Governments, and voluntary agencies now spend well over \$100 million a year on pre-schools, day-care centres, family day-care schemes, toy libraries and so on. There are over 3,500 community pre-schools and 40,000 places available in commercial day-care centres.

"This means a very large number of parents, teachers, aides and volunteers are involved in one way or another, and many are finding it difficult to keep up with news and information about developments interstate and overseas. The Resource Information Service will help to overcome that problem."

The options being offered in the Service include the "Australian Journal of Early Childhood", a quarterly journal already established, with some 2,500 subscribers; and "Parents News Sheets", which cover a range of topics on child development. Nearly a quarter of a million of these are presently distributed each year.

One of two new options will be a series of "Resource Booklets" which will be mailed five times each year. These will be about 16 pages each, and cover such topics as "A Reading List for Parents" and "Activities for Home and School". The fourth option will be the "E.C. Up-Date Service", which will include Newsletters, Resource Information Bulletins, copies of press clippings, and brochures on early childhood publications and films.

The cost of the options range from \$2 to \$12, or \$25 for the total package.
