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Children Australia is a quarterly journal which aims to provide an opportunity for service providers, academics and others concerned with children, young people and families to report on their work, to raise issues and to share their views.

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Children Australia is a refereed journal with the majority of papers being peer reviewed to assess their suitability for publication. Peer-reviewed papers are expected to meet contemporary academic standards. However, at the discretion of the editor, papers which have not been reviewed are published from time to time. Such papers may include short commentaries on practice issues that are essentially based on observation and experience; reports on program approaches, initiatives or projects that are both short and unreferenced; historical overviews; or short papers that respond to a peer-reviewed article published in an earlier edition which adds to informed debate or provides an alternative perspective. It is anticipated that no more than one such paper would be included in each issue.

In order to clarify which articles have been reviewed and which have not, we now include a symbol at the end of each article as follows: \blacksquare = peer-reviewed article; \square = non-reviewed article

Theme:

Poverty and Child Abuse and Neglect

Children Australia is calling for research, policy, practice interventions and legal papers that address the issue of Poverty and Child Abuse and Neglect. There is mounting international evidence that economic poverty and the resultant social disadvantage is a major factor influencing the incidence of abuse and neglect.

This issue will draw on national and international evidence to explore our understanding of the relationship between poverty and abuse and neglect, by asking the question - How should this relationship be addressed in casework practice and legal cases when child protection authorities institute care proceedings against parents who are living in poverty?

Deadline for manuscripts - 1 December 2019.

The Special edition expected publication date is June 2020.
