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A.C.T. CHILD WELFARE LAWS UNDER REVIEW

The Law Reform Commission has received a reference from the Commonwealth Attorney-General, Senator Durack, requiring examination of the reform of child welfare laws in the Australian Capital Territory. Although the reference is related to the law of the A.C.T., it is hoped that the project will be of utility to any State as well as Commonwealth administration.

The Attorney-General has appointed Dr John Seymour of the Australian Institute of Criminology to be a Law Reform Commissioner, and Dr Seymour has taken charge of the reference on child welfare.

The work on the review of child welfare laws in the A.C.T. is seen by the Law Reform Commission as a major contribution by the Commonwealth to the International Year of the Child. A discussion paper, "Child Welfare — Children in Trouble" has been published and public comment invited.

NO-TAX DEDUCTIONS STOPS SUPPORT FOR CHILDREN'S PROJECTS

Many big companies had shut their doors to sponsoring major International Year of the Child projects because the Federal Government refused to declare donations tax deductible.

New South Wales Minister for Youth and Community Services, Mr Rex Jackson, said this recently.

"The Australian Government had been amongst the countries that unanimously supported the United Nations declaration of 1979 as International Year of the Child", Mr Jackson said.

"Its refusal now to grant tax deductions to companies sponsoring domestic children's projects during 1979 is highly questionable.

"Especially, when you consider that the Prime Minister (Mr Fraser) has declared donations to the recently established Sir Robert Menzies Memorial Trust are tax deductible and will be matched dollar for dollar by the Federal Government.

"People can form their own judgement on the strategy applied in making that decision.

"In New South Wales we have been fortunate to receive generous sponsorships from some companies.

"However, in the case of a large number of companies approached they have gone cold on sponsorship deals when told the Federal Government will not grant them tax deductions on money allocated for these children's projects.

"Recently, we had been near to finalising a \$50,000 sponsorship and the company concerned withdrew at the last minute, partly because they could not be guaranteed tax deductions.

"The New South Wales Government has earmarked \$500,000 for International Year of the Child Projects in 1979.

"However, we need private sponsorship to get other projects off the ground which include new services in local areas, helping Aboriginal mothers with parenting and nutritional programmes and a Kid's Museum.

"We have a cupboard full of projects and I am certain many more companies would only be too willing to offer their financial support if they were given these not unreasonable tax deductions," Mr Jackson said.

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AUSTRALIAN CHILDREN 1979

The South Australian Department of Community Welfare, in conjunction with the South Australian IYC Secretariat, is planning to produce a book tentatively titled "Australian Children, 1979" for the Year of the Child.

This publication will be modelled around a book produced in the U.S.A. by the National Council of Organizations for Children and Youth to commemorate the U.S. Bicentenary in 1976.

Subject matter will include Children in Poverty, Child Health, and Family Changes. It is anticipated that an appendix specifically related to local State issues will be added.

FATHERS COMMEND THE FAMILY

National Marriage and Family Week, 1979, was launched by three Victorian Fathers of the Year. Neale Molloy (Father of the Year, 1963), Denis Oakley (1972) and Ian Ellis (1978) joined forces to promote the Marriage and Family Week theme for the year, "Belonging—the Family in the Year of the Child". A discussion and activities brochure on the theme was distributed nationally during the week May 6-13, and is still available from the Children's Bureau of Australia. The brochure is suitable for use by parents' groups, schools, community and religious organizations—and by families themselves.

2UE'S TELEPHONE COUNSELLING SERVICE

As part of its contribution to the Year of the Child, Radio 2UE Sydney has run a telephone counselling service, offering help for children, and their parents and relatives.

The Project was run in co-operation with the New South Wales Secretariat for the International Year of the Child, with help from relevant Government Departments.

The 2UE 'Care for Kids Switchboard' handled most of the problems received off-air, with trained counsellors taking the calls. 2UE launched the service on the evening of Friday, June 22, with a three hour programme from 9 p.m. conducted by Ian Parry-Okeden. 2UE's regular night-time Forum programme featuring Ian Parry-Okeden attracts 25% of the listening audience.

The following morning, and for the following 6 days between 9 a.m. and 10 p.m., trained counsellors handled calls from parents and children. Confidentiality and anonymity were guaranteed.

Specificially, the service was aimed at helping children with problems they cannot discuss with anybody else and helping parents and relatives with problems they may have with their children. Such help was given through immediate counselling on the telephone and referral to other help groups.

Ms. Helen Lynch, trained psychologist, co-ordinated the project for 2UE.
