FOSTERCARE POLICY & PRACTICE IN SWEDEN What lessons are there for Australia?

This article describes the development of fostercare policy and practice in Sweden from the 1600's to the present. It highlights the significance and extensive use of fostercare compared to alternative child care measures. The recruitment, assessment and training of fosterparents and the degree or support for both foster and biological parents is examined. An overview is given of research concerning the outcome of fostercare in Sweden. It concludes with a discussion of the factors likely to affect the future of fostercare in Sweden. Implications for Australian fostercare are drawn from comparison with Swedish developments in fostercare.
