## Many Problems

To be placed in an institution you immediately gain some kind of independence and are also forced to face many problems in which you are expected to cope with. Responsibilities of a sixteen year old may be placed upon that of a thirteen-fourteen year old. This is why I feel most of these adolescents appear to be more mature in comparison with one who has lived in a normal home life situation.

## Suicide "attempts"

Those who need a lot more than others cannot always be given it, therefore suicide and other such drastic methods seem to be the only answer.

Not many of these teenagers form relationships with the staff for it places a lot of responsibility on them, such as behaviour.

Those that do, their relationships are based on hate, for they cannot, as yet, have a normal relationship whether it be because they have never had one before, or previous relationships haven't worked out.

Boyfriends of some of these adolescents are often looked upon as father images — others are just there as attention givers.

## Lesbian Relationships

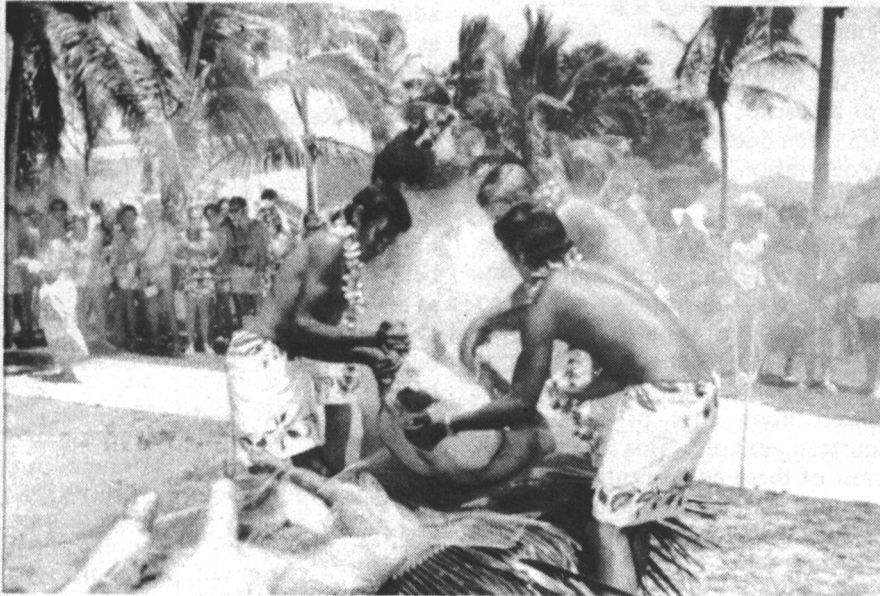

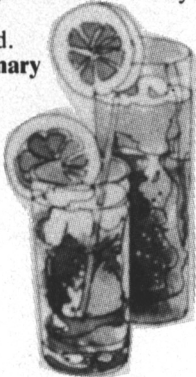


# Under the palms a polynesian feast

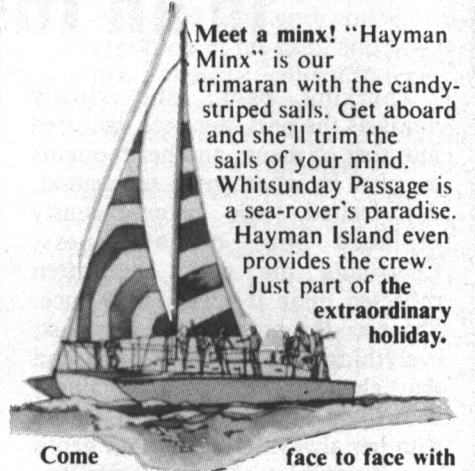
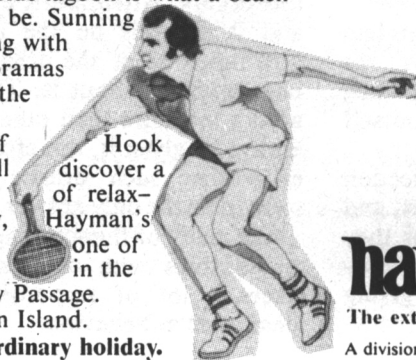
