Juvenile crime is the subject of increasing concern in many parts of Australia. Issues relating to juvenile justice have been discussed extensively in recent months in the media and other public forums. This conference will provide the opportunity for participants to clarify and examine many of these current issues.

### Aims of the Conference

To identify the actions needed to reduce to an absolute minimum the incidence of juvenile crime.

To assess the effectiveness of the current treatment of juvenile offenders and propose new approaches.

- Social factors influencing juvenile offending such as unemployment, drugs and alcohol
- The police and young offenders
- The role of the courts and the sentencing of juveniles
- Early intervention strategies and diversionary programs for juveniles
- Young Aboriginal offenders
- Correctional options for young offenders
- Parental responsibility and accountability
- Positive approaches for the future
